As Principal I set extremely high standards for myself, my staff and all students. These standards range from behaviour in and outside the classroom to uniform and dress. As a uniform school, variations to the school uniform are unacceptable and students have been informed that certain types of dress are not acceptable from Term 4 and 2021, namely beanies and

non-school based baseball caps. My goal is for every Boy who walks through the corridors of Blacktown Boys High School to be proud of their school and to confidently say that they received the best education possible by coming to our school. I want our local community to speak highly of the boys so that the best opportunities are afforded to them. From the onset, I have set the bar high for my staff to provide a quality learning experience for every boy in every class. I also set the bar high for my students. I expect every student to try his best. If a student walks away from our school and can confidently say "I achieved my best" I am confident that he will have the tools and resources to make a successful life for himself in the future. We must all remember that we are all part of a team of parents, guardians, students and staff working towards achieving your son's future aspirations. I am confident to say I have an expert staff and the resources at hand to help all students (7 - 12) to achieve and work towards their future goals. I want Blacktown Boys on the map for quality educational achievement focussed on setting students up for employment across all areas of work. I want students to have the tools and experiences for a safe, healthy and culturally rich lifestyle when they leave school and I want them to have developed skills through our wellbeing program to have the tools to meet any social and personal challenge head-on and win. Some people think that Term 4 is a downhill run until the end of the year. Not so at Blacktown Boys High School! It is a time of new beginnings and ongoing planning and development.

Formal schooling for Year 12 2020 ends with the commencement of the HSC, a week later this year, on Tuesday 20th October. This change has pushed Graduation back, with a hope that Covid-19 restrictions may be relaxed – no guarantees though! A new date, 19th November has been added to the calendar as a backup date for students to celebrate their 12 years of education in a Covid-19 safe environment, abiding by the restrictions of the time. Their Year Advisor Mr Dibbs, who has been a part of their lives for the past six years, has put in a lot of effort to ensure that this day will hold special memories for them. I would like to wish the HSC class of 2020, all the very best for their pathways into the next stage of their lives, knowing that we have, in partnership with their families and carers, been a huge part of making them into the young men that they are today.

For Year 11, their recent exams signalled the end of the year 11 courses, with the rigours of the HSC course starting Day 1 Term 4. It is important that all students maintain

100% attendance and punctuality in order to maximise their post-school options. The need to work as a team with staff and each other was very clearly outlined to Year 11 in a meeting with our new Principal, Mr Calleja and Year Advisor, Ms Hussein. Blacktown Boys is the perfect place for students to be nurtured during their final two years of schooling, with a staff that knows and understands their needs and learning styles, where we are not so big that we cannot give them the individual attention that they need and deserve.

It may come as a shock to current year 10 students that they will start their HSC course in less than twelve months' time. Subject selections have already been made by Year 10 after planning and thought processes that started at the end of Term 2, involving teachers, Head Teachers, the Year Advisor, the Careers Advisor, our Subject Selection hub, parents, and most importantly the students themselves. Term 4 will see the launch of 'Step Up' which includes: completing the mandatory requirement of "All My Own Work" prior to commencing Year 11; learning about navigating NESA with Students Online which not only supports students, but also mandates the requirements for the attainment of RoSA, Year 11 and HSC courses; stress management; becoming leaders; team building; and ICT skills for seniors. The 'Step Up' program is designed to further equip students for the rigours of their final two years of schooling.

For Year 9 the formal part of the RoSA is close, and they need to demonstrate that they are attempting all course outcomes with diligence. In three terms time they will be selecting courses for Stage 6 and the HSC. It is never too early to start thinking about future pathways

and interests that they would like to follow, by focussing on their work, researching and asking questions of teachers, family and friends. For Year 8, subject selections have also been made for their electives in Years 9 and 10. We are currently looking at new Covid safe ways to transition our year 7 2021 students into high school life.

All in all, it has been a stressful year for some as we learn to do things differently and accept changes that we would not have dreamt of this time last year. There is no denying that the year has seen an increase in anxiety in families and in our boys, but through it all school, has been the one place of 'normalcy' where students get to do what they need to do most to enhance their wellbeing - that is socialising, after periods of isolation and getting back in to a routine. I would like to thank all of the staff and our parent community for their help in doing this.

## HEAD TEACHER MATHS Ms Xiao Chirgwin



The start of Term 4 marks the beginning of the HSC examinations for our Year 12 students. The following are some tips and advice.

#### **Year 12 HSC Revision and Exam Tips**

#### • Prior to HSC

- Learn the reference sheet formulas and how to use them
- Prepare how you will use your reading time
- Prepare how you will progress through the exam
- Have time checkpoints for your progress through the exam, check time allocation for multiple choice section
- Work through multiple full past HSC/trial exams as a single sitting in the time allowed for the HSC, including reading time
- Create a two-page summary of each topic
- When completing practice questions, make specific notes of things you find you forget or struggle with

#### • The Day of HSC exam

- Get a good night's sleep the night before your exam
- Adopt healthy eating habits

- Check you have all required equipment including good quality black pens, calculators, a ruler, etc.
- Have a back-up calculator is a good idea, check it is NESA approved
- Ensure you arrive on time for your exam

#### • Tips for HSC Exam

- Stick to your plan for the use of reading time
- Write using good quality black pens
- Attempt all multiple-choice questions, don't leave any blank
- Read questions carefully, underline key words in the question
- When you think you've finished a question, re-read the question to check you have answered all parts
- Show all relevant working incorrect working should be crossed out with a single line, do not use white-out
- Use the reference sheet
- Show the formulas you have used in a question
- Look at the number of marks for a question and answer accordingly
- Keep track of your progress against the time in the exam
- Don't round off answers too early
- Always check your final answer makes sense
- Sketch graphs in pencil and go over them in black pen
- Take care of units, and show units in your answer where relevant

- If you can't show a result for an earlier part of a question, still use that given result to complete the following parts of that question

## HEAD TEACHER SCIENCE Mrs Maninder Kaur



Both junior and senior students have been extremely engaged with their studies in Term 3. It has been a very busy and productive one for Science at BBHS!

Year 12 sat their Trial HSC examinations at the beginning of the term. Teachers provided them effective and constructive feedback, post Trials for all the Science courses. The majority of students took all the feedback on board and worked hard for the remainder of the term. We wish Year 12 all the very best as they begin their HSC examination.

Year 11 students have completed their Yearly Examination and are keen to start the HSC courses. They will receive their results early in Term 4. Year 10 students have enhanced their knowledge about the living world by learning about genetics and evolution, which also gave them an opportunity to look closely at microbiology including the science behind cloning. They also completed subject selection and selected courses for Year 11. The Science faculty is running the Science Transition Program in Term 4 for students who have selected the science courses in Year 11 at BBHS. The aim of these sessions is to consolidate the scientific skills, so there is a smooth transition from Stage 5 to Stage 6.



Year 7 students have investigated the basics of Newton's laws and application of forces in everyday life. They have actively participated in applying their scientific skills and knowledge in constructing and testing the forces involved in bridges and bodies under 'free fall' such as parachutes. Year 8 students have looked at the origin and importance of different forms

Students in Years 8 and 10 completed their 'student research projects' where they had to research secondary sources, carry out a first- hand investigation and present a report on their findings.

However, to ensure the safety of all students, only those who are wearing black, leather shoes, and acting responsibly, will be able to

Year 8 students will be sitting their mandatory VALID Science Test in week 3, Term 4. It will be based on skills and content covered in Stage 4.

#### Snapshot of our Classrooms in HSIE

The following snapshots are of some of the excellent things that students have been participating in throughout Term 3 and Term 4.

#### 7HSIM

Year 7 have just begun their new topic, 'Place and Livability' in Geography. We have been learning about the factors that influence where people live, why people sometimes choose to live in places that are not the most suitable choice for them and how the livability of places is assessed. 7M practiced making judgements about livability by developing their own specific criteria for what schools need to be safe, successful, enjoyable places. They then walked around assessing each element based on their observations during a HSIE Lesson. Students had to think carefully about the state of the location/facility, provide a score, complete a fieldsketch as evidence of their decision and then provide an overall opinion and score for the school. We are looking forward to more exciting learning in HSIE as we wrap up the 2020 school year!

#### 9 Commerce

This term, Year 9 Commerce classes have been delivering travel presentations, intended to persuade an audience to travel to a destination from the perspective of a travel agent. Each student was assigned a 'traveler



type', including budget conscious young travelers and wealthier business people. The task involved researching a 14-day trip to include sightseeing, food, itinerary, travel options, as well as risks, medical, visa and passport requirements when visiting destinations around the world.

#### Year 12 2021

It is important that our new cohort of Year 12 students are focused on their studies and working hard to achieve their personal best in all aspects of the course. Students should be motivated and utilising teacher feedback to improve their understanding of content.

Remaining motivated over the holidays is imperative to student's development in their HSC HSIE courses. By the end of this term, students should have completed their first topic for the course and should utilise their holidays to create study notes and respond to past paper questions about the topic.

Blacktown Boys' students have been actively involved in TAFE NSW's Youth Engagement Strategy PLUS (the YES+ program), which helps students engage with learning in a hands-on environment at TAFE. Students get support to develop individual learning plans, engage in vocational taster courses and receive ongoing mentoring, counselling and career advice. The program gets students out of the school setting and into TAFE-style learning and on relevant industry sites. The YES program is based upon the idea that there are many ways and places that learning can occur and that mainstream education is not for everyone.


YES has ongoing flexible enrolments and a personalised learning approach. YES operates as a 'school within a school' with its own time table and broad and diverse curriculum offerings from years 9 to 13. These integrate with



the wider school community allowing students to engage on different levels with the program as needs require or emerge.

Cyber security was very popular with our students as 12 boys enrolled and attended the course at TAFE Blacktown. As one student commented; 'Cyber security is growing by over 12% per annum and is one of the most important industries to the safety of world economies and personal securities and freedoms'

#### 2021 YEAR 7 YEAR ADVISER Ms Cindy Tang



Thank you to all the families who have followed procedures regarding enrolment into year 7 for 2021. A year 6-7 transition program helps students become familiar with the school. Currently, we are discussing the possibility of a virtual transition or a limited transition program in this COVID safe environment being mindful of the Department of Education's guidelines and current health advice.

#### The following is an extract from the NSW Government regarding transition programs for students:

- Ensure all students attending have submitted a completed enrolment form, which has been reviewed by the school.
- Ensure a risk assessment has been developed for any student with additional learning, health care or behavioural needs. Further transition opportunities will be possible for students with additional needs.
- Students should be kept in groups to minimise mixing of students where possible. These groups should be maintained throughout the visit, including with any older students who may act as a guide, and a record kept of their names where possible.
  - Have strategies in place to

ensure students arrive and depart promptly and keep interactions with the wider high school group and other staff to a minimum. For example, start times should be after and before the regular high school start and finish times.

- A maximum of two visits can be held for students during Term 4 scheduled for after 12 November 2020.
- Transitioning Year 6 to 7 students should be kept separate from the high school student population including during break times.
- Plan the transition program and student movements within the school in advance to reduce crowding or large gatherings of students and staff where possible.
- Students should not be together in large groups in a hall for more than 1 hour. Students to be seated, ideally within their primary school groups where possible.
- Ensure that all attendees including students and staff are well and free of any flu-like symptoms. Exclude students who are unwell.
- Keep a record of student names and visiting staff from primary schools who attend the orientation including details on where the students have engaged with others or participated in activities within the school. Records must be kept by the high school for at least 28 days after the event. This record must only be used for the purposes of contact tracing.
- All attending staff from primary schools need to maintain 1.5m physical distance from other adults and this requirement should be promoted.
- Adopt and promote good hand hygiene practices and make

sure that bathrooms are well stocked with hand soap and paper towels or hand dryers and have hand sanitiser at key points around the school such as entry and exit points.

- Minimise sharing of items where possible. Where items and equipment are shared, ensure cleaning protocols are in place between and after use.
- Wipe down high-touch surfaces after activities. Students may be asked to wipe down their area at the end of the activities with wipes provided by the school.

We will be sending out updated information to our year 7 2021 students regarding the transition program. In the meantime, we look forward to meeting all our Year 7 2021 cohort.

**Staying Safe while Staying Connected** 

After a period of learning from home, it was recognised that in order for us to maintain our wellbeing, it is important for us to stay connected to one another. One way that a lot of Year 8 students were staying connected was through online gaming platforms and social media. Although these options were definitely following social distancing rules and were COVID-safe, there was still the real question as to whether or not these platforms were truly safe for young people.

During Term 3, Year 8 were able to gather together to hear a presentation from the Police Liason Officer Ally Watts. Sun and UV at School: Learning about skin cancer prevention

In the lead up to summer, students will learn about sun protection, and how to make healthy, safe and proactive choices that reduce their risk of skin cancer.

Statistics show that melanoma is the most common cancer affecting young Australians aged 15-24. With that in mind, we will be teaching students about the dangers of sun exposure and that skin cancer prevention starts with practising sun-safe behaviours at school.

This focus on sun safety follows the release of a suite of interactive skin cancer prevention resources for NSW schools. Transport Concession Entitlement Card September 2020

#### Change update:

From mid-October 2020 Transport for NSW is expanding the customer groups that use the Transport Concession Entitlement Card to include school students who travel on a Child/Youth Opal card or child/concession ticket.

#### Overview:

The Transport Concession Entitlement Card is used to prove customers' entitlement to concession fares across NSW. It is currently issued to customers including tertiary and TAFE students

NSW public transport customers pay adult fares from the age of 16 years. Students 16 years or older can travel on child/concession fares as long as they carry a proof of entitlement card and show it to authorised officers or police officers upon request.

#### School students:

The Transport Concession Entitlement Card will replace these cards from mid-October 2020:

- Senior Secondary Student Concession Card (16 years and over) includes Mature Secondary Students (18 years and over), Distance Education Students and Home School Students
- Proof of Age card (when a student under 16 years of age looks older)
- Boarder Rail Pass.

Students will continue to use the older-style cards until they expire.

Please remember: Rural and regional bus drivers and authorised officers will need to check cardholder details on the back of the card.

#### School Travel for 2021



#### 2021 school travel applications are now open

Applications for student travel in 2021 opened from Monday 12 October 2020.

Students who require a School Opal card or travel pass for 2021 can now <u>apply</u> online. A new application should be submitted if a student is applying for a school travel pass for the first time or requesting an additional pass as a result of a new shared parental responsibility situation (e.g. joint custody).

Students who have changed school/campus, changed address, repeated a year or received an expiry notification from Transport for NSW for their school travel entitlement should re-apply or update their details.

"Applications must be completed by the student's parent or legal guardian if the student is aged under 16 years. Students 16 years and over must complete the application form themselves.

Where there is a change of distance eligibility based on a student's grade, the system will automatically update a student's entitlement if they meet the new criteria. If they do not meet the new eligibility criteria, they will receive an expiry notification via email.

Students who have an entitlement approved under a medical condition which is due to expire will receive a notification advising them to re-apply.

Term Bus Pass holders will receive a notification to re-apply.

If a student needs to update their information or re-apply, they should go online to https://apps.transport.nsw.qov.au/ssts/updateDetails

Applications need to be submitted before 31 December 2020 to ensure that current student entitlements are updated and their current entitlement/card remains valid. If their application is submitted after 31 December 2020, the system will automatically cancel an entitlement/card and a new one will need to be issued.

Students in the Opal network applying for a SSTS or Term Bus Pass entitlement for the first time will receive their card at their nominated postal address. Cards will be mailed out from January 2021.

Students residing in Rural and Regional (R&R) areas should receive their travel pass at the commencement of the new school year from their nominated operator, this may be distributed via the school or sent direct to their address. Note: some R&R operators do not issue travel passes. Students/Parents should confirm with their nominated operator if they do not receive a pass.

#### New Concession Entitlement Cards

Transport for NSW will be replacing the below cards with Transport Concession Entitlement Cards (TCEC) from October 2020:

- Senior Secondary Student Concession Card (16 years and over) also used by Mature Secondary Students (18 years and over), Distance Education Students and Home School Students
- Proof of Age card (when a student under 16 years of age looks older)
- Boarder Rail Pass.

All previous cards will be valid until they expire. Students who require a Transport Concession Entitlement Card should speak with their school administration staff.

From January onwards, there will be a number of School Opal cards expiring, as the physical card has reached its lifespan.

These are cards for students who will be in years 8 to 12 in 2021, and only those Opal cards which haven't been replaced in the last five years.

Impacted students and/or their parent/guardian will be contacted directly by Transport for NSW via email or post. They will be asked to confirm their details online in order for a new School Opal card to be sent to the correct postal address in time for the new school year.

If contacted by Transport for NSW, details should be submitted <u>online</u> by December 1, 2020 at the latest. Affected students who do not confirm their details in time will have a new School Opal card posted to the address we currently have on file.




