In addition, we started the year with the computer section of our library refurbished and extended to cope with a full class size undertaking online activities.



ATTENDANCE

I would like to take the opportunity to thank parents and students for making 2017 a fantastic year at Blacktown Boys' High School. Our attendance rate has increased year again and it is fantastic seeing students at school and learning each and every day.

Some students have their educational progress interrupted by absences which are more often than not, unnecessary and for reasons fairly low on the 'important to their future' scale.

To reach their full potential at school, students need to attend every day. This means a few days off per year due to genuine illness. One day a fortnight off will accumulate to 20 days absent per year. This equals 120 periods absent, the equivalent of 4 school weeks per year.

How can any student be expected to keep up with work under such circumstances?

Parents have a critical role to play in protecting their son's future. Absences can be minimised by arranging dental and doctor's appointments after school or during the holidays. Shopping, helping at home and visiting relatives may all seem important at the time but not as important as a person's **FUTURE**.

Let's work together and make our boys understand that 'It's not OK to be away!'



If you have any concerns about your son's learning throughout the year, please feel free to contact their Year Advisor or Mrs Chirgwin.

TEXTBOOKS

Like previous years, students in Year 7 – 10 will use the Cambridge Mathematics textbook in class. Students will not be issued with an individual textbook but will need to bring in a USB drive at the beginning of this term to get an electronic copy of their textbook in order to complete homework and any extra study to improve their results.

If access to a computer at home is an issue, please contact Mrs Chirgwin as soon as possible to make alternative arrangements.

CALCULATORS

It is extremely crucial that every student have their own it and that they bring their calculator to each lesson. We recommend the CASIO FX82 or CASIO FX100, as they are NESA approved calculators. Students will need NESA approved calculators for NAPLAN and HSC examinations, available to purchase at the office for \$20. Having their own calculator and practising the functions regularly helps students to build their fluency, and improve

their ability to respond to problems quickly.

NESA does NOT accept mobile phones as calculators for NAPLAN and HSC examinations and the Mathematics Faculty at Blacktown Boys High School will also follow the same requirements to make sure your sons are prepared for these important examinations.

HOMEWORK AND MATHSPACE

Students will have Mathematics homework after almost every lesson. This usually consists of individual practice including the completion of exercises from the textbook or worksheets

This year, Year 7 will also be utilising an interactive online program called Mathspace. Subscription to Mathspace is \$10 per student, pay at the front office.

It is important that students attempt homework every day. Homework helps students to review and consolidate their understanding of the concepts taught in class. It is also a great self assessment tool for students so they can identify their own areas of weakness. We encourage your sons to seek help from their teacher with any issues from their homework.

ASSESSMENT TASKS

All formal assessment dates are published on the Mathematics Faculty page of the school website:

http://www.blacktownb-h.schools. nsw.edu.au/curriculum-activities/ curriculum/mathematics

and on the Sentral Parent Portal.

Parents can help the students prepare for each assessment task by:

- * Ensuring that all homework is up to date
- * Seeking help from the teacher
- * Promoting a regular study and revision regime at home

- * Encouraging thorough revision before the assessment task
- * Being vigilant about attendance so that your son doesn't miss out on essential information
- * Ensuring that students bring all necessary equipment including a NESA approved calculator to the assessment task available to purchase at the office for \$20.

Year 12 students are already well into their courses with their most of their first assessment tasks completed in Term 4 last year.

The next HSC assessment task for most courses will be the Half Yearly examinations at the end of Term 1.

MATHEMATICS COMPETITIONS

This year, we have also introduced APSMO Mathematics Olympiad Competition to our students from the Year 7 and Year 8 selective classes. This is a fantastic opportunity for students to develop flexibility for problem solving, foster creativity, and stimulate enthusiasm for mathematics.

All students are invited to participate in these two competitions:

* Australian Mathematics Competitions (AMC) are held on 9th August, 2018 * ICAS Mathematics Competitions are held on 14th August, 2018

LUNA PARK

The Annual Mathematics Reward Day to Luna Park was held on 8th of December, 2017. This day is a chance for our faculty to say thanks to all of those students who work consistently throughout the year, and make teaching such a rewarding experience; they don't only go to those students with the highest marks. Invitations for students who consistently try their best in Mathematics are sent to parents early in Term 4. We hope to see more students joining us on this special event this year.

YEAR 9 PRACTICAL CLASS

This term, our Year 9 students have their practical task in Mathematics.






They worked together in teams to measure the dimensions of different household objects. Students applied measurement skills they've learnt in their theoretical lessons to calculate the surface area and volume of those objects. The Mathematics staff were extremely proud of all of our Year 9 students' engagement in this handson activity.

FUN FACT: INTERNATIONAL (Pi) DAY

(Pi) Day is celebrated on March 14th around the world. The Greek letter (Pi) is the symbol used in mathematics to represent a constant, which is approximately 3.14. It is the ratio of the circumference of a circle to its diameter. (Pi) continues indefinitely without repetition or pattern, its infinite nature makes it a fun challenge to memorise.





HEAD TEACHER SCIENCE

Two highlights for Science in Term 4 of 2017 were Men's Health Day and the excursion to Sydney Observatory.

For Men's Health Day, students learnt about the structure of the eye and key factors affecting eye health. They constructed paper models and worked as scientists to perform an eye dissection, under the expert guidance of Ms Hall and Ms Winata.

The excursion to Sydney Observatory gave students from Year 10 the opportunity to experience the "Space is Big" exhibition. Students worked as astronomers, using the telescopes, and were able to experience the enormity of space in the planetarium.

With five classes taking Science subjects in Year 11 the laboratories are buzzing. As part of the new Biology syllabus, students are participating in a field trip to the Field of Mars reserve, to study factors affecting the survival of species. This will form part of their first assessment task. Year 7 students have been welcomed into the Science laboratories, studying the safe use of Science equipment in order to gain their Bunsen burner licences

HSIE staff would also like to congratulate our 2017 HSC students for their excellent achievements. In particular, we are very proud of the excellent results obtained by our 2017 HSC students in our HSIE KLA area. In Ancient History 50% of students achieved band 5 or higher, in Legal Studies 57.2 % of the cohort achieved Band 4 or higher and in History Extension 25% of the cohort achieved an E3. Business studies once again performed strongly with 28.6 % of the class achieving a band 5 or higher. We wish all students the best in their tertiary study, gap year or their transition into the world of work.

Hi everyone, my name is Miss Cookson!


My favourite thing about teaching HSIE is watching my students uncover facts about the past and ask

The following are some adult and classic books which have been popular with students over the years:





The Time Machine: "I've had a


most amazing time...."

to Marseille to marry his Catalan fiancée Mercédès. Thrown in prison for a crime he has not committed, Edmond Dantès is confined to the grim fortress prison of Château d'If. There he learns of a great hoard of treasure hidden on the Isle of Monte Cristo and he becomes determined not only to escape, but also to unearth the treasure and use it to plot the destruction of the three men responsible for his incarceration.



ATTENDANCE

There is a distinct link between consistently high attendance and positive learning outcomes. Students should be attending school every day unless there are extenuating circumstances such as sickness.

For extended leave such as holidays or religious purposes, please inform the front office so that the relevant documentation can be completed. If the attendance rate for a student falls below 85%, steps will be taken to address the situation commencing with a discussion with the student to ensure that we maintain an attendance rate above this level.

SCHOOL ABSENCE

For any absences from school it is imperative that a note explaining the absence is brought to school on the next day of attendance. This must be handed to the Homeroom teacher.

UNIFORM



NAPLAN on paper – information for parents and carers

Why do students do NAPLAN tests?

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) assesses literacy and numeracy skills that are essential for every child to progress through school and life.

Students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 participate in the annual NAPLAN tests in reading, writing, language conventions (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy.

The tests provide parents and schools with an understanding of how individual students are performing at the time of the tests. NAPLAN tests are just one aspect of a school's assessment and reporting process; they do not replace ongoing assessments made by teachers about student performance.

NAPLAN tests also provide schools, education authorities and governments with information about how education programs are working and whether young Australians are meeting important educational outcomes in literacy and numeracy.

What will be tested?

NAPLAN assesses literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through their regular school curriculum. All government and non-government education authorities have contributed to the development of NAPLAN materials.

To give you an idea of what the tests look like, see example questions at nap.edu.au/naplanexample

How can I help my child prepare for NAPLAN?

Help your child prepare for NAPLAN by reassuring them that the tests are just one part of their school program, and by reminding them on the day to simply try their best. Teachers will ensure students are familiar with the types of questions in the tests and will provide appropriate support and guidance.

ACARA does not recommend the use of services by coaching providers or excessive preparation. NAPLAN is not about passing or failing, but about assessing learning progress.

Participation in NAPLAN

All students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 are expected to participate in the annual NAPLAN tests.

Students with disability may qualify for adjustments that reflect the support normally provided for classroom assessments. A formal exemption may be granted for a student with significant intellectual disability and/or significant coexisting conditions, or for a student who has recently arrived in Australia and has a non-English speaking background.

Your school principal and your local test administration authority can give you more information on special provisions or the process required to gain a formal exemption.

Will my child sit NAPLAN on paper or online?

Your child will sit the NAPLAN paper tests in 2018.

However, children in some other schools across Australia may sit the NAPLAN online tests this year. Federal, state and territory education ministers have agreed that NAPLAN will move online over the next two to three years. State and territory education authorities will determine when their schools move online

As students are presented with questions that test the same range of difficulty, regardless of whether they complete the test online or on paper, results for both formats will be reported on the same NAPLAN assessment scale.

What if my child is absent from school on test days?

Where possible, schools may arrange for individual students who are absent at the time of testing to complete missed tests at another time during the testing week. Individual students are not permitted to sit tests after Friday 18 May 2018.

How is my child's performance measured?

Individual student performance is shown on a national achievement scale for each test. A result at the national minimum standard indicates that the student has demonstrated the basic literacy and numeracy skills needed to participate fully in that year level. The performance of individual students can be compared to the average performance of all students in Australia.

A NAPLAN report will be issued by your school later in the year. If you do not receive a report, you should contact your school.

How are NAPLAN test results used?

- Students and parents may use individual results to discuss progress with teachers.
- Teachers use results to help them better identify students who require greater challenges or additional support.
- Schools use results to identify strengths and weaknesses in teaching programs and to set goals in literacy and numeracy.
- School systems use results to review programs and support offered to schools.
- The community can see average school NAPLAN results at myschool.edu.au

Does your child catch a school bus? Help them keep it!

As the bus operator that providing your child's school bus services, we're asking for your help getting your child to use their Opal card on every bus trip.

Since the introduction of the School Opal card in 2016, school bus patronage data has significantly dropped. This is not reflected in the number of students actually travelling on our buses for various reasons a large number of students are consistently not using their Opal cards as they should be.

Opal data gathered by tapping on and off is used by transport planners and service schedulers to design the bus network that best serves the community utilising the resources available.

If students don't tap on and off then school bus services will appear underutilised and may be considered for cancellation based on low passenger numbers.

Please help us reinforce the message that tapping on and off every bus journey with an Opal card is essential to travel on the bus. This will ensure school services continue to be planned for the students that use it, providing the journey to school your children depend on.

To help us achieve this, please talk with your child:

- Ask them if they tap on and off the bus with their Opal card.
- If they do, congratulate them for doing the right thing and talk about why it's important.
- If they sometimes don't or never do, ask them why.
 - Are they confused about why they have to? Talk about why it's important, and that every tap tells the bus planners that the bus is needed.
 - Do they forget? Help them find a way to remember, such as getting into the habit of getting their Opal card out as soon as they arrive at the bus stop or bus line.
 - o Is their Opal card at the bottom of their bag? Help find a handier place to keep it.
 - Are they influenced by friends or peers that don't tap? Talk about how they like to travel on the bus with their friends and how tapping is what keeps the service running.


