# Message from the Principal - Mr David Calleja



I would like to welcome everyone back after a well-deserved break. Since my start in 2020, the school has progressed in leaps and bounds. Our whole school vision to improve facilities, improve academic outcomes and maximise student results continues to move forward. Over the last two years, I have collaborated with staff, students and parents to improve the long-term physical and educational aspects of our school, with a firm belief that a quality learning environment is the linchpin facilitating improvements the students are seeing across our school. I have begun to focus on a faculty-by-faculty basis with investment in our sporting facilities including a new volleyball court and the upgrade of our junior basketball and indoor soccer courts. We have also upgraded our cricket pitch and cricket nets. With the construction of a COLA in our main quad, we will look at utilising this new undercover space for the future. As we have been improving our sporting facilities, work has been taking place in the background on our technological facilities including our computers, Wi-Fi, hardware, and software programs. This month our school will have a total revamp of its IT cabling and wiring. This will boost the speed and availability of Wi-Fi across the school. The school has

also invested heavily in laptops for each faculty and this will continue into 2024 and 2025. By investing in computers, the school eases the burden on families having to mandatorily purchase a device for their children. As a public school, our focus is on equity and accessibility for all. New computers at our expense ensures that everyone has access to technology and no-one is disadvantaged. In line with improvements to technology, our library is in the planning stages for a total refurbishment to make it a hub for learning and enquiry. We are hoping this new space will be operational from the start of Term 3 and will complement our new senior study centre. Our next focus area will be in the CAPA and TAS faculties, bringing our hands-on faculties a welldeserved infusion of funds to improve their facilities.

As the year progresses, our staff are continuously undertaking professional learning across all aspects of education. There are areas which are mandatory for all teaching and executive staff across all schools in NSW. This includes child wellbeing, cyber-security, Aboriginal cultural education and anaphylaxis training to name a few. Staff are also undergoing in-house training in classroom management and restorative practices, student wellbeing and curriculum development. Through Professional Learning our staff become skilled in the delivery of their subject areas, the management of their classes and ultimately contribute towards the ongoing educational development of your child. The school invests heavily in professional learning which contributes towards an ongoing quality learning environment.

Connecting with parents and actively engaging them in their son's education, development, wellbeing, health and safety continues to be a priority. We have recently been checking student files and it has become very clear that several students with allergies and who are susceptible to an anaphylactic reaction have not updated their Medical Summaries. Others have not updated Asthma and medical Action Plans, phone and home details. It is imperative that when your details

change, the school is informed immediately. This also applies to court proceedings and documents associated with child access etc. All students who require an EpiPen are always to have these at school in the case of an anaphylactic emergency. I will remind parents that they have a legal obligation to provide the school with an EpiPen if their child requires one. As a legal requirement, the school is legally obliged to report any parent who refuses or fails to supply such a device when requested. If you have inadvertently overlooked supplying an EpiPen, please do so as soon as possible by contacting the front office staff. Please support us in supporting you and your child.

Finally, I would like to thank all the students, staff and parents for your support during the implementation of Yondr in our school. The creation of a phone free space in classrooms and the playground has had immediate positive impact on student behaviour, classroom engagement and social interactions in the playground and I am looking forward to seeing how this impacts student wellbeing and academic improvement in the long term.

# Deputy Principal message: Mrs Trish Matthews



I would like to welcome our new families whose boys enrolled during Term 2. From my conversations with them they have settled in well and are making new friends.

Most of you would have heard of Artificial Intelligence (AI) and your sons may have had conversations with you about it. Whilst it is a vast unknown resource that may have many

benefits for society (just as the inception of the internet did), it certainly does have implications and challenges for all students, whether they are at school or university.

The 3 main current concerns are: Firstly **Plagiarism** – this is taking intellectual property that is not your own and claiming it as your own. Secondly **Ethics** – because AI tools take content from a wide variety of sources the final product is a mixture of many other people's work, and these people are not credited with it (like intellectual theft). Thirdly **Biases and Misinformation** – AI can only learn from it sources so if the original material is incorrect or biased (let's face it, we don't believe everything written on the internet) it may convey untruths written as truths.

### Guide to ChatGPT for Parents and Caregivers



### What is ChatGPT?

ChatGPT is a computer program that uses artificial intelligence (AI) to generate text. Launched by research company OpenAI, it

gathers large amounts of data from the internet to create responses on demand. ChatGPT is unique because its answers are in conversational format, similar to how people write and speak. It can write essays and computer code, solve math problems, and much more.

### How do you use ChatGPT?

To use ChatGPT, you first create a free account <u>on the</u> <u>OpenAl website</u>. Then you simply type questions or commands in the text box. Your requests can be as basic or elaborate as you can imagine. For example, you could ask it to write a story in the voice of your favorite movie character. Or ask it to give you a recipe based on the food you have at home. The tool allows you to continue to refine the answer by adding more instructions. ChatGPT saves a record of your conversations that you can view or continue at a later time.

### Where does ChatGPT get its information?

To craft its responses, ChatGPT copies and remixes information from other places on the internet. It doesn't tell you its sources or who created the original information. As of this article's publication date, it uses internet data created up to 2021 only. The tool is still being developed, so it can make mistakes, spread misinformation, and give inaccurate answers.

### Why are schools banning ChatGPT?

Many school districts <u>are blocking ChatGPT</u> on campus networks and school-issued devices. The concern is that students could use it to do their schoolwork for them, from writing papers to solving equations. They could also be turning in work with inaccurate information. Educators are worried the program could affect students' learning if they rely on it. Check with your children's school to see if and how they allow students to use ChatGPT.

### Should children use ChatGPT?

OpenAI's <u>Terms of Use</u> state that users must be 18 or older. However, it doesn't ask users to verify their age when creating an account. Younger kids could easily access ChatGPT and come across content that's not ageappropriate. In addition, ChatGPT collects personal information and user data. This info is used to improve the system and can be shared with third parties for things like advertising. Under the Children's Online Privacy Protection Act (COPPA), collecting personal information from children under the age of 13 is illegal without parental consent.

If kids are interested in using ChatGPT, the best option is to use it alongside an adult. Kids could use ChatGPT with a parent or caregiver to get ideas about things they're interested in, like writing code or music. Families can explore the tool together and try prompts that are fun, inspiring, or helpful. Ask it to write a play with parts for everyone, or put together a poem in Yoda's style to read out loud.

### How can I talk to my child about ChatGPT?

If your children use or want to use ChatGPT, consider talking about these topics:

- Explain the importance of checking the credibility of a source before trusting the information, and point out that ChatGPT does not give sources for its information.
- Help them understand that plagiarism is when you take someone else's work or ideas and present them as your own. Using ChatGPT to do your schoolwork could be considered plagiarism or cheating.
- Talk about how you might use ChatGPT as a family to be creative or get inspired. Have it create a list of outdoor activities for kids, or ask it to suggest a craft project to try.

be used after the transition and will automatically redirect to the new system

• After the transition, a School Bytes portal will be available for you to register and begin using (Link: https://portal.schoolbytes.education)

• All previous payments made will be migrated to the new School Bytes finance system and portal

### What is the School Bytes portal

The School Bytes portal provides flexibility for you to conveniently:

- Make school payments online (including paying for multiple siblings at once)
- Use a family credit to pay for an activity or school contributions
- Download a receipt for payments made
- View all historical payments in one place
- Complete and submit digital permission notes
- View the status of all permission notes
- Request a refund if required

This can be done where you want at any time: day or night.

Through the portal, you will easily be able to download a receipt once a payment has been made and have access to view all historical payments when needed. Online payments are

processed in real-time and can be viewed by school staff immediately.

While our preference is for payments to be made via the portal, we will still accept payment via cash, cheque, money order and EFTPOS.


In Week 5, students in Year 10 studying Macbeth will be given the opportunity to see a performance of Macbeth: The Rehearsal by Bell Shakespeare with some students from Blacktown Girls. We're looking forward to seeing the performers go through the dramatic language of the play and how this helps create meaning for the audience.

As Year 10 begin to consider their senior studies, we look forward to communicating with you and your sons about options for English in the senior years and the academic demands of each of the available courses. Being in the most appropriate course is essential for your son's wellbeing and academic achievement, and the English faculty will work with you to guide students into the best course for them. I look forward to supporting you and your sons as they prepare for their senior years.

Year 7 and 9 students are continuing with their literacy studies this term with a focus on different parts of speech: nouns, verbs, adjectives and adverbs. These whole school literacy periods (WSL on students' timetables) will focus on ensuring students have a strong understanding of these important components of a sentence to craft accurate and meaningful sentences that help precisely convey their intended meaning. We encourage all Year 7 and 9 students to have a book that is dedicated to their literacy lessons.

In the first round, the students came away with a win against The Ponds HS, but unfortunately lost to Cheltenham Girls in round two. Pi Day (<sup>*π* Day)</sup> was commemorated at Blacktown Boys' High School on the 14 March 2023. Did you know?


Pi Day is an annual celebration of the mathematical con-

### MR PACE AND ITALIAN LANGUAGE 2023.

Italian is a language that immerses students in culture, sounds, communication and collaboration. We have found it possible to overlay a number of excursions with Visual Arts to expand student perceptions of alfresco culture. Yr 8 students have enjoyed the Cronulla Alfresco / Sun- surf awareness excursion and will attend the Art Gallery NSW to view Art Express and the Classical / traditional paintings of a largely influential Baroque and Rococo era.

Students need to be clear: the more you practice both written and spoken coursework, the better you become.

Projects of cooperation and teamwork along with individual exercises are promoted in this course. It is multi-faceted and instills personal challenge, discipline and application. Students are enjoying it and we are keen to further the ways in which we as a faculty can host learning that benefits all of our course content.

### YEAR 7 OCEANS 2148 COURSE

Please note we have moved the Cronulla excursion to year 8, and attached it to the Alfresco program as a follow on from the Oceans 2148 program studied in year 7.

WHY? : In order to field this excursion students must have attended an approved water challenge experience to determine their wswimming level and approval to swim on our excursion. This water challenge assessment occurs at 'LETS SWIM for Year 7' in Term 4.

Students may still attend Cronulla excursion in 2024 but cannot swim unless they have completed the above mentioned challenge.

Since then, students have gained confidence and an understanding of the rules of court procedure, in particular in calling witnesses, presenting legal arguments, and raising objections. Students have spent 3 weeks in preparation for their next round which is scheduled to take place on Friday 19<sup>th</sup> May.

### **Excursions**

### Year 10 Geography Excursion

Year 10 Geography students had the opportunity to attend the Bonnie Vale Wetlands excursion as part of their geographical investigative study last term. Ranger Jamie reinforced content studied in class about the *rich natural diversity of wildlife of the wetlands. He explained* the reasons wetlands are a critical part of our natural environment and discussed the threats to wetland ecosystems globally. Students actively engaged in a range of hands-on fieldwork using geographical tools including quadrats, maps, graphs, statistics, images, anemometers, and temperature gauges to assess the health of the wetlands and later in the day developed sustainable strategies to minimise environmental impacts.

### **History Medieval Day**

We were so pleased to see the return of the Medieval Show to Blacktown Boys' High in Week 8, Term 1. The presenter enthralled his audience with gruesome stories about crime and punishment, tales of the code of chivalry, weapons, and fighting techniques during the Middle Ages. Year 8 students were particularly excited to have an opportunity to dress in chain mail, to touch, and feel the weapons, up close, creating an intensely vivid, and tactile link with the past.

Overall, both students and supervising staff had a great morning.

This presentation of not only ancient Egyptology but the ancient world carries the student on a journey of discovery learning, interactive, multimedia, and hands-on learning experience focused on developing a knowledge-based understanding and positive appreciation of archaeology and its relevance for today.



parents. Please pay the \$10 entry fee at the Front Office or online. We look forward to seeing your fantastic results once again.




As it is mid-year, Junior Science assessments this term will be Half-Yearly Examinations held during the respective grades Assessment Week. Students are encouraged to refer to the assessment notification that was issued to them during class and to follow the explicit instructions outlined in the notification to prepare for the task. During Science classes, students will be taken through revision content and techniques to empower them for their upcoming assessment. In order to further prepare for the upcoming examinations, students are encouraged to develop concept maps that outline and link the subtopics within the overarching topic. Students can use this as a checklist as a recognition of their fantastic progress throughout the year.

Year 12 are now a little over half way through their HSC courses, having completed 2 assessment tasks and 2 modules for each of the courses- Physics, Chemistry and Biology. It is a pleasure to see students reflecting on their learning and actively seeking feedback from teachers to continue developing their understanding and application of scientific concepts and practical skill

Supporting Year 11 and Year 12 Science students in their studies, the Science Faculty has implemented Edrolo - an online learning platform to assist students in consolidating their understanding. Students are encouraged to routinely review their understanding through the revision of the content and through the completion of the quizzes. courses with their Science teachers, before or after class, as well as at the upcoming Subject Selection Evening.

As we approach the midpoint of the year, there are several key events for all parents/carers and students to be mindful of. Minimum Standards testing has taken place for Year 10 students, with catch-ups provided for Years 11 and 12 for students who needed to sit the tests. These tests are a requirement for all students in NSW, where they must demonstrate a minimum level of profi-

ciency in reading, writing and numeracy prior to receiving their HSC. Information about these tests can be found on the NESA website, and further catch-up sessions will run in term 2 for students needing to complete these tests.

Students in Year 8 and 10 will also be completing their Subject Selection for Stage 5 and Stage 6, respectively, and will be provided additional information about it. Parents and carers are encouraged to discuss elective choices with their children, and should remember that students will perform better in subjects they enjoy and are good at. I emphasise that these should guide all decisions made regarding subjects chosen for Stages 5 and 6. More information about Subject Selection will be provided separately at a later date. Finally, a reminder that the EAL/D survey is currently being completed, and at the beginning of Term 3 the NCCD will take place. These two surveys do not affect students, but are a requirement of all schools to provide data about the types of learners they have, as well as the potential needs of all students and how they are supported. ### **Career Adviser, Mr Trevor Hodges**



Year 12 students have been actively involved in extra curricula seminars with 'future students' representatives' from multiple universities. University of Sydney, New South Wales, Macquarie, Western Sydney and UTS to name a few.

Students gain firsthand knowledge of University and Pathways into courses

that serve their career aspirations. Presenters are 2<sup>nd</sup> to 3<sup>rd</sup> year students at university who share their stories of progression from acing the HSC through to applying through UAC as well as university early entry schemes. Course structures and combinations available to complete Degrees were discussed and explained in-depth. These incursions are an important part of all year 12 students' education as they assist students on their pathway from school to work and further study.









On Friday 23<sup>rd</sup> June 2023, Year 12 senior students from Blacktown Boys' High will be attended the Careers Expo at Sydney Showground, Sydney Olympic Park. The focal point of this excursion is to allow students to access information on tertiary institutions, business, employment and training services, including apprenticeships. In addition to the 140 providers, students have the opportunity to attend professional seminars on a variety of topics, in 4 separate seminar rooms, such as, extension Mathematics and English, History, Sciences, Economics, studying tips and tricks. Feedback from students from previous visits has been very positive. The cost to students is \$20, which includes a 3-day pass to the event and a seat belted bus to and from school to the venue. Places are limited, so you need to book early, hand in the completed note and payment to the front office. Parents of all grades have the opportunity to attend the Careers Expo in person over the weekend, 24<sup>th</sup> and 25<sup>th</sup> of June.

### **YES Tafe programs**

Blacktown Boys' students have been actively involved in TAFE NSW's Youth Engagement Strategy PLUS (the YES+ program), which helps students engage with learning in a hands-on environment at TAFE. Students get support to develop individual learning plans, engage in vocational taster courses and receive ongoing mentoring, counselling, and career advice. The program gets students out of the school setting and into TAFE-style learning and on relevant industry sites. The YES program is based upon the idea that there are many ways and places that learning can occur and that

These integrate with the wider school community allowing students to engage on different levels with the program as needs require or emerge. implemented. I hope to hear more positive feedback as the year progresses.



### Year 9 Assessment Week

As this period can be stressful, a reminder to all year 9s to ensure that they are managing their time and also focusing on their sleep and health during this period.

### **Assessment Booklets**

The PE changerooms can also not be used so students should be bringing their sport uniform on the days that they have 'PEP' on their timetables. . Year 9s have sport Period 5 and Period 6 every Wednesday. Students should only be wearing their sports uniform to school on Wednesdays. If students are not coming to school with the correct uniform, they need to provide a note from their parents/guardians to the HT of Administration for a uniform pass.

### Attendance (start of school and to each period)

Students need to be at their homeroom by 8:10am every day. There is a warning music bell that goes at 8:05am to signify that it is time to go to homeroom. If students arrive at school after 8:10am, they need to go to the front office to get a late note. Students need to also be mindful about when recess and lunch ends, and need to actively make their way to their class room when the 5 minute warning bell rings to signify the end of recess and lunch.

# Some tips for parents/guardians in developing Student Voice at home!

(The following has been taken from the NSW Department of Education's website)

### What is student voice?

Student voice is defined as students actively participating in decision-making on things which shape their educational experiences. It is an approach to education that values the perspectives, experiences and aspirations of students across three settings; the classroom, the school and in the wider community.

### How are student voice and wellbeing connected?

When children and young people participate in meaningful decision-making at school, they:

- experience higher levels of wellbeing and empowerment
- feel a deeper connection to their learning and school community
- develop a range of skills and capabilities to feel connected and successful at school and in life.

### How can student voice be encouraged at home?

As a parent, you want your child to love learning. You want them to feel confident in expressing their voice, having influence and making authentic choices at school. There are many ways you can support this at home and further develop the skills they are learning at school.

### Top tips for supporting student voice at home

- Create opportunities within the home for your children to lead activities and make meaningful choices, for example, organising meals or a family outing.
- Support your children in identifying and celebrating their personal strengths and those of others.
- Support your children in making learning goals and sharing them with their teachers. This will empower them to shape their learning environment to reflect their unique needs.

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- Encourage them to be a leader in their classroom, school and communities. These do not have to be traditional leadership positions, such as school captains. Students can become peer-support leaders, playground monitors, joining clubs and committees or become student mentors and volunteers.
- Create opportunities for collaboration in the home, for example, cooking or building something together.


