We believe that communication between the school and the community is essential to the academic growth and social wellbeing of our boys, so parents are reminded to update their email addresses so that they can access our Parent Portal, which gives them access to their son's timetables, attendance and relevant documents as well as online bookings for Parent Teacher evening. We welcome suggestions from parents about information that they would like to access on this portal.

At the forefront of a lot of parents' minds, and certainly an active topic in the media, is cyber safety. Every student at their first year group meeting viewed a Digital Safety presentation, a copy of which has been placed in the Parent Portal so that you can view the introductory message given to students and the links that they can use for support. Year Advisors have also been working with resources on the e-safety Commissioner site, to continue to inform students about their rights and responsibilities and what constitutes criminal activities in terms of usage of social media. Many students are surprised about what they are allowed and not allowed to do as part of Digital Citizenship, as they come to terms with harnessing the power and recognising the potential risks of using this resource.

We recognise that many parents are 'navigating unchartered waters' in managing the use of devices at home, quite often with children who have had use of a device since they were 18 months of age, where parents controlled what was used and purchased. This is particularly difficult when children in the families sometimes range from pre-schoolers to university students. # Students need reading, writing and numeracy for everyday life after school



This is why students need to meet a minimum standard of literacy and numeracy to receive the HSC from 2020.

#### **ONLINE READING, WRITING AND NUMERACY TESTS**

- Students need to achieve Level 3 or 4 in short online tests of skills for everyday life.
- Students get **up to four times per year** to sit each minimum standard reading, writing or numeracy test.
- Schools will help students to decide **when they are ready** to take each test.
- Students **do not need** to sit the reading, writing or numeracy test(s) if they achieved Band 8 or above in the respective 2017 Year 9 NAPLAN test(s).

#### **PROVISIONS AND EXEMPTIONS**

Provisions for the minimum standard tests are available for some students with disability. Some students with disability studying Life Skills courses may be exempt from meeting the minimum standard to receive their HSC credential.

Welcome back to another year of exciting learning opportunities at BBHS! With the new year comes new teachers, and we wish to welcome both Ms Hakim and Ms Arnold to the English faculty. We hope they have a wonderful time teaching at BBHS.

As always, it is great to hit the ground running across all of our year groups. Our Year 12 students are working away on their respective modules and preparing to submit their second assessment tasks (due Monday 16 March for both courses). Being almost at the halfway point of the Year 12 course, it is strongly advised that students begin to collate study notes for course content to date and ensure that they are familiar with all texts and concepts studied so far. If there are any questions, please ask your English teacher sooner rather than later.

Year 11 have had a great start to their senior studies, with students working diligently on their first module: Reading to Write. We are impressed with the early demonstrations of commitment across the courses and hope that this trend continues as the year goes on.

Year 10 have begun exploring their poetry unit, 'Poetry that Shaped the

World'. This has involved exploring the issues of the world through poetry, both in today's society and in the past. Students have also been invited to participate in the Passion Project, an initiative to prepare students for the demands of English Advanced in Year 11, should they wish to undertake the course. More information for parents and carers will available shortly.

For Year 9, the students have been exploring the idea of gender in society and texts, as well as studying a Shakespearean play through this lens. We highly anticipate their presentations which will take place later in the term. Year 8 have been exploring the topic of Villains and how they are presented in a variety of texts. Their first task is a narrative, so it is a great opportunity for the boys to get creative!

Last but not least, a heartfelt welcome to our new Year 7 students, who have made a great start to their high schooling years! We have the Year 7 students in our classrooms for Home Room each morning and they are on time and in uniform, ready to learn each day. In English, they are learning about heroes and the reasons why they can be considered heroic. The Year 7 teachers are looking forward to some fantastic heroes speeches later in the term!

Welcome from HT Teaching and Learning

With 2020 underway I am happy to say welcome back to everyone, and am introducing myself in my new role. As the new Head Teacher of Learning Support, I have several areas of responsibility that will assist students in their learning, as well as the professional development of staff. Chief among these is managing the Learning Support Team, which consists of our new English as an Additional Language/Dialect teacher Ms Semerci, our Learning and Support teachers Ms Josan and Mr Dibbs, Careers Advisor Mr Hodges, and School Counsellors Ms Del Duca and Mr Tse. The Learning Support Team is responsible for providing support to students in a variety of ways, including in their study skills, transition to life beyond school, and language development. The Learning Support Team also works with our Welfare Team and entire school staff to address student needs in multiple ways.

Further to this, another area I am overseeing is the National Minimum Standards Tests. All students are required to achieve a Level 3 or Level 4 result across tests in Reading, Writing and Numeracy. NESA has determined that students who do not meet these requirements will not receive a HSC. Students in Year 12 in 2020 had the opportunity to achieve a Level 3 or 4 equivalent in their Year 9 NAPLAN, while all students in Years 11 or below must sit the tests regardless of their NAPLAN results. #### 2019 HSC MATHEMATICS RESULTS

Again, our boys achieved amazing results in the 2019 HSC Mathematics courses!

In the Mathematics Extension 2 course, all of our students have achieved a Notional Band 6. Ajay Arudselvam ranked first in this course, gaining 92 as his HSC mark, followed closely by Farhan Mostafa with a mark of 91. These are outstanding results for the fifth year that the Mathematics Extension 2 course has been offered at Blacktown Boys' High School.

In the Mathematics 2 unit course, more than 58% of our students achieved the top two bands. Birananvan Srikumar ranked first in this course, with a HSC mark of 96. The following students all gained a mark above 90: Rahul Jose, William Luu, Hai Xin, Ben Thomas, and Austin Tsai.

In the Mathematics Standard 2 course, Baljosh Gill ranked first, gaining a Band 5.

In the Mathematics Standard 1 course, Warwick Senjak ranked first also gaining a Band 5.

We are extremely proud of all of our students whose achievements are the direct result of their hard work, dedication and determination throughout the whole course. We expect to see great results continuing with our current Year 12 cohort for the 2020 HSC.

#### TEXTBOOKS

Like previous years, students in Year 7 - 10 will use the Cambridge Mathematics textbook in class. Students will not be issued with an individual textbook but will need to bring in a USB drive at the beginning of this term to get an electronic copy of their textbook in order to complete homework and any extra study to improve their results.

If access to a computer at home is an issue, please contact Mrs Chirgwin as soon as possible to make alternative arrangements.

#### CALCULATORS

It is extremely crucial that every student have their own calculator and they bring their calculator to each lesson. We recommend the CASIO FX82 Plus II or CASIO FX100, as they are NESA approved calculators. Students will need NESA approved calculators for NAPLAN and HSC examinations. Having their own calculator and practising the functions regularly helps students to build their fluency, and improve their ability to respond to problems quickly.

NESA does NOT accept mobile phones as calculators for NAPLAN

and HSC examinations and the Mathematics Faculty at Blacktown Boys High School will also follow the same requirements to make sure your sons are prepared for these important examinations.

#### HOMEWORK AND GOOGLE CLASSROOM

Students will have Mathematics homework after almost every lesson. This usually consists of individual practice including the completion of exercises from the textbook or worksheets. Some teachers may keep the record of homework on Google Classroom, and other resources may also be uploaded on there. This is a virtual learning space where students can work collaboratively.

It is important that students attempt homework every day. Homework helps students to review and consolidate their understanding of the concepts taught in class. It is also a great self-assessment tool for students so they can identify their own areas of weakness. We encourage your sons to seek help from their teacher with any issues from their homework.

#### ASSESSMENT TASKS

All formal assessment tasks will be notified with an assessment task notification which would be given out at least 2 weeks prior to the due date of the task.

Parents can help the students prepare for each assessment task by:

- Ensuring that all homework is up to date
- Seeking help from the teacher
- Promoting a regular study and revision regime at home
- Encouraging thorough revision before the assessment task
- Being vigilant about attendance so that your son doesn't miss out

on essential information

• Ensuring that students bring all necessary equipment including a NESA approved calculator to the assessment task

Year 12 students are already well into their courses with most of their first assessment tasks completed in Term 4 last year. The next HSC assessment task for most courses will be in the second half of Term 1.

#### MATHEMATICS PEER TUTORING

Maths Peer Tutoring Program is running again this year. This program is dedicated to helping our Year 7 to Year 10 students. It is running every Tuesday and Thursday recess and lunchtime. Year 11 and 12 Mathematics student leaders have volunteered their time to be the tutors. The feedback from our students in the last two years has been really positive. If you think your son would benefit from joining this program, please ask them to see Mrs Chirgwin or Miss Alfonso in the Mathematics faculty.

#### MATHEMATICS COMPETITIONS

We have had great enthusiasm from our students participating in the APSMO Mathematics Olympiad Competition in the last two years. Last year, our Year 8 selective class has achieved top 25% as a team in the NSW state. This year, our students from Year 7 and 8 Selective classes are going to continue their journey with this competition. This is a fantastic opportunity for students to develop flexibility for problem solving, foster creativity, and stimulate enthusiasm for mathematics.

All students are invited to participate in the Australian Mathematics Competitions (AMC) is held on Thursday 30<sup>th</sup> of July 2020.

six Year 11 and four Year 12 Science classes this year. As part of the Biology syllabus, Year 11


students are participating in a field trip to Penrith Lakes, to study factors affecting the survival

12 students attended an excursion to Sydney University where they had the opportunity to carry out chemical analytical techniques using very sophisticated and advanced equipment, which is otherwise not available in high school laboratories. Students had a very informative session on understanding the instrumentation of spectroscopic techniques, which is part of their HSC Chemistry syllabus.

In order to consolidate the concepts learnt in class and master the 'working scientifically skills', it is very important that both junior and senior students attempt homework on a regular basis. It helps students to review and reinforce their understanding of the work covered in class and assists them to improve in their areas of weakness. This term, 9N have learnt about the transatlantic slave trade. A part of the unit of work, they conducted a



Welcome to New Students

Welcome to all those new students who have just started at Blacktown Boys High particularly the newly enrolled Year 7 students and their parents.

All new students are welcome to visit the library during Recess or Lunch. They will find many students either reading the books, working on assignments, using the library computers or enjoying a game of chess.

Junior students can borrow two fiction and three non-fiction books while senior students can borrow three fiction and four non-fiction books for a period of two weeks. Printing is available to all students from the library computers and print stations.

The Premier's Reading Challenge is made available to students each year with many students usually completing the challenge and receiving a Certificate from the Premier's Department.

My name is Mr Everingham and students and parents are welcome to contact concerning advice about book choices, library services or research advice.



The NSW Premier's Reading Challenge is open again for 2020. The aim of the challenge is to encourage students to read widely for enjoyment and knowledge. Participation in the challenge will improve their reading and writing skills and expose them to a wide range of ideas and situations which will be of positive help in their developing intellectual and emotional maturity.

All boys from BBHS from years 7, 8 and 9 are invited to enter the Premier's Reading Challenge for 2020, and continue the recent history of attainment at Blacktown Boys High in this area. Those students who successfully undertake the challenge will read 20 books before 11.59pm on Friday 28th August 2020. The official starting date for the Challenge is Monday 2nd of March 2020.

Students who achieve this will be awarded a *Premier's Reading Challenge Certificate*. If they have completed the challenge 4 times they will receive a *Gold Certificate* and if they have completed the challenge 7 times they will receive a *Platinum Certificate*. If a Year 9 student has completed the challenge every year from Year 3 to Year 9 the will receive a *PRC Medal* from the Premier's Department.


The nine graphic novels in the series tell of their

The story involves Naruto a ninjain-training with a need for attention, a knack for mischief and, sealed within him, a strange, formidable power.


Students love these books, they are easy to read and wonderfully illustrated. One of the most popular series in the library.




**Superheroes**: Perennially a favourite with many students


